

## Law Day 2010 Distinguished Speakers

### **Mark Adler**

**Deputy Chief Litigation Counsel, Division of Enforcement, U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission**

Mark has been Deputy Chief Litigation Counsel of the SEC's Division of Enforcement since August 2004. As Deputy Chief Litigation Counsel, he assists in supervising the Division's nationwide litigation program. Mark previously was a trial attorney in the Division of Enforcement for almost seven years, where he was lead trial counsel in a wide variety of complex securities actions. Before joining the SEC, he spent nine years with the Department of Justice, where he prosecuted major white collar criminal cases, including complex bank fraud cases in Texas, Massachusetts, and Virginia. From 1981 to 1987, Mark handled civil litigation and other general commercial matters in private practice in New York City. He received an undergraduate degree summa cum laude from Tufts University in 1978 and a law degree from Harvard Law School in 1981.

### **Judy Conti**

**Federal Advocacy Coordinator, National Employment Law Project**

Judy Conti presently serves at the Federal Advocacy Coordinator for the National Employment Law Project. Judy has been an advocate for workers for her entire legal career. She began as a union-side attorney with the D.C. law firm of James and Hoffman in 1996, and after almost 5 years representing union members and plaintiffs in employment actions, left private practice to co-found the D.C. Employment Justice Center, a non-profit organization devoted to securing, protecting and promotion workplace justice in the D.C. Metropolitan area. Under Judy's leadership, the EJC collected over \$3 million in wrongfully withheld wages and benefits from workers, advocated for the passage of laws that dramatically reformed the DC unemployment and workers' compensation programs, and the EJC led a coalition of advocates to successfully design and pass the nations second paid sick leave law. For her work with the EJC, Judy was recognized by the Hispanic Bar Association of D.C., Jobs with Justice, the American Bar Association, OMB Watch, the Washington Area Women's Foundation, Williams College and was named the Attorney of the Year by the Washington Metropolitan Employment Lawyer's Association. In October 2007, Judy moved to NELP and opened its D.C. office. There, she coordinates all of NELP's federal work, including lobbying Congress and working with the Administration and administrative agencies to implement programs and protections designed to help workers achieve the promise of economic opportunity that work should provide. Judy also serves on the Board of Governors for the D.C. Bar, the Board of Directors for the Marshall-Wythe Alumni Association, and she is a 1994 graduate of the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William and Mary, and a 1991 graduate of Williams College.

### **Justin Krieger**

Justin Krieger's practice focuses on intellectual property litigation, patent prosecution, and client counseling with a technical expertise in chemistry. Mr. Krieger specializes in patent litigation and has participated in all phases of patent litigation including discovery, trial and appeals. He also is experienced in handling Section 337 investigations before the US International Trade Commission (ITC) and Interferences before the Board of Appeals and Interferences.

**Linda Quigley**

**Practicing Attorney, Williamsburg Adjunct Professor William & Mary School of Law**

Linda Quigley is an associate with The Matthews Law Group specializing in copyright, trademark, and Internet law issues, as well as electronic discovery and business law. She also serves as the Assistant Director for Research, Professional Education, and Electronic Discovery for the Center for Legal and Court Technology (CLCT) at William & Mary Law School. In addition to practice, Linda is also an Adjunct Professor of Law at William & Mary, teaching Electronic Discovery and Internet Law. In the past, Linda has also taught courses in legal research and writing, constitutional law, and technology-augmented trial practice and assisted in the creation of the law school's Constitutional Literacy Seminar in which law students teach the Bill of Rights to local high-school students. Additionally, Linda instructs attorneys on a wide range of Continuing Legal Education topics and works with the law school's Institute of Bill of Rights Law on its annual Supreme Court Preview.

Linda received her B.A. from the University of Notre Dame and her J.D. from William & Mary Law School. Prior to law school, Linda was a freelance writer and editor of nonfiction books.

**Philip Urofsky**

**Partner, Shearman & Sterling LLP**

Philip Urofsky is a partner at Shearman & Sterling LLP, where he counsels a wide range of clients on issues involving compliance with the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, as well as white collar criminal and civil defense and internal investigations. He formerly held a number of positions within the Fraud Section of the U.S. Department of Justice, leaving in 2004 as an Assistant Chief of the Section. While at the Fraud Section, Mr. Urofsky was responsible for the investigation and prosecution of violations of the FCPA, including the Saybolt, Mead, Metcalf & Eddy, King, Cantor, Kay, Syncor, Giffen, Monsanto, ABB Vetco Gray, and Titan matters and tried more FCPA cases while at DOJ than any other DOJ attorney. In addition, Mr. Urofsky represented the United States during the negotiation of the Council of Europe's Criminal Law Convention on Corruption and the GRECO agreement and was designated by the U.S. government as an expert to participate in the OECD Working Group on Bribery's peer review process. He was also responsible for drafting the legislative package for the 1998 amendments of the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, which implemented the OECD Convention on Combating Bribery of Foreign Public Officials in International Business Transactions. Mr. Urofsky was also the principal drafter of the Department of Justice's Federal Principles of Corporate Prosecution (the "Holder Memo") and has published articles on compliance programs and independent monitors.

**Ned W. Waxman**

**Professor, Business Law, Mason School of Business, College of William & Mary**

Professor Waxman is a graduate of the Wharton School and the Emory University School of Law. He has served as a law clerk for a United States District Judge and a United States Bankruptcy Judge, practiced bankruptcy law in Atlanta, and served as the first Estate Administrator for the Bankruptcy Court for the Northern District of Georgia, where he supervised the Panel of bankruptcy trustees. He is a member of the State Bar of Georgia and the Washington D.C. Bar, and is admitted to practice in the United States Supreme Court. He also has served as an adjunct professor at Emory University's School of Business Administration, and at Mercer University in Atlanta. He is a former president of the Mid-Atlantic Academy of Legal Studies in Business.

Professor Waxman joined the faculty of the College of William & Mary in 1982. He teaches undergraduates and MBA students “The Legal Environment of Business;” “Commercial Law and Business Organizations;” and “Contracts Law, Partnerships and Corporations, and Bankruptcy and Reorganization.” He has published extensively on bankruptcy law, including five editions of the Gilbert Bankruptcy Summary (a popular book for law students and professors), numerous law review articles, e.g. the Ohio State Law Journal, and articles for the American Bar Association Journal and other practitioner journals. He is a nationally recognized expert on bankruptcy law. Recently, he published a major article in the Houston Law Review and filed an *amicus curiae* (“friend of the court”) brief in the United States Supreme Court concerning an important and controversial issue under the Bankruptcy Code.

Professor Waxman designed, developed, and participated in Law Days 2005 – 2009 for the MBA program, which were very successful. Professor Waxman and a committee of eight first-year MBA students planned Law Day 2010.
