William & Mary inducts 25 into honor society

Business students to join Beta Gamma Sigma at event tonight on campus

WILLIAMSBURG, Va.—Twenty-five students at William & Mary's Raymond A. Mason School of Business will be inducted tonight into Beta Gamma Sigma, the scholastic honor society for business education.

The 23 undergraduates and two graduate students have distinguished themselves through outstanding performance. The undergraduates rank in the top 10 percent of their academic class, and the graduate students rank in the top 20 percent of their class.

"This is an impressive group," said William L. Stauffer Jr., clinical associate professor of business and the faculty adviser to William & Mary's Beta Gamma Sigma chapter.
